THE UNESCO CHAIR IN VULNERABILITY STUDIES, UNIVERSITY OF HYDERABAD

The UNESCO Chair in Vulnerability Studies, located in the Department of English at the University of Hyderabad, is the outcome of a decade's-long work by the Chairholder Prof. Pramod K. Nayar in the interrelated fields of human rights, literary-cultural studies, environmental crisis, ecological precarity, industrial disasters, species vulnerabilities, and extreme cultures. The Chair provides a theoretical, pedagogic and curricular framework for understanding, teaching and studying the Sustainable Development Goals set by the United Nations. The Chair's objectives include developing a conceptual vocabulary of vulnerability, pedagogic tools and cultural apparatuses to ameliorate, sensitise and prevent an amplification of the multiple vulnerabilities the globe witnesses, and the archiving of a history of contemporary vulnerabilities engendered by climate change, health crisis, gender inequalities, and the greying of populations, among others. This teaching and research unit has organised several lecture series with eminent national and international scholars as resource persons, designed courses, and conducted seminars in the core areas that come under the Chair's purview. The Chair engages in fruitful academic collaborations with renowned institutes of higher education in India and abroad.

ABOUT THE PROGRAMME

Literary and Cultural Theory, in its plural forms, has always critiqued and called into question a range of vulnerabilities of different kinds and degrees that constitute texts and lives, whether of the proletariat or the new precariat. This Faculty Development Programme (FDP) brings together a group of experts who discuss topics as diverse as Thing Theory and Famine Comics, Plastic Studies and Plant Humanities, Body Studies and Ecocriticism, Urban Studies and Feminism, Animal Studies and Ageing, Care and Wellness and Posthumanism, Memory Studies and Climate Crisis, War in Comics and Food Security, the vulnerable child and the precarity of the mind, and the limits of language and representations in literature. These topics, methods, and schools of thought are nevertheless connected, as they are inquiries into issues that have assumed the force of an urgency that is immediate, at levels ranging from the personal to the planetary. The FDP will foreground how acts of reading are practices that demand a theoretical knowledge and a practical involvement from the reader of texts, who must position themselves at interdisciplinary intersections, while demonstrating the continuing imbrication of discourses, entangled and precarious, dominant and otherwise, in colluding with and/or struggling against hegemonies and marginalities.
